The Seven Wonders of the Ancient World are: (1) The Pyramids of Egypt; (2) The Hanging Gardens of Babylon; (3) The Statue of Zeus (Jupiter) at Olympia; (4) The Temple of Artemis (Diane) at Ephesus; (5) The Mausoleum at Halicarnassus; (6) The Colossus at Rhodes; and (7) The Pharos of Alexandria.

The Most Spectacular Launch Failure: Designed as a key part of the Societ program to land a human on the moon, the giant *NI* rocket was abandoned after its third failure to launch on July 3, 1969, less than two weeks before the start of the US's successful *Apollo 11* mission. The last failure of *NI* resulted in a huge explosion that killed many Soviet rocket scientists at the launch site in Russia which resulted in the end of the Soviet effort to land a man on the moon.
